JONATHAN'S LEGACY LEGISLATION

Ending Overdoses and Rebuilding Lives in Sullivan County, NY

PURPOSE

- To Increase understanding of the crisis
- To expose the failure of managed addiction
- To advocate for a solution that guarantees every person the **choice** for lasting, drug-free freedom.



M.A.T.

- Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) is the primary statefunded approach to addiction.
- It is the **mandated policy** as the "rehabilitation" path across New York State.
- Billions in funding flow to MAT programs each year.

MAT is built on addiction maintenance, not freedom.

THE REALITY

- MAT's stated goal is "harm reduction"
 - Reduce deaths
 - Reduce risky behaviors
 - Keep people in treatment
 - Drug Abstinence is not required
 - The exclusion of other treatment options with documented success rates is a critical part of the problem.

Jonathan's Legacy proposes a recovery-first model with the goal of "harm eliminate" freedom from dependency and restores lives.

MAT REPLACES ONE DRUG WITH ANOTHER

- Methadone and buprenorphine <u>are</u> opioids
- Patients remain dependent
- Stabilization is prioritized over freedom





HIGH RELAPSE RATES

- Over 60% relapse within one year
- MAT users mix drugs, worsening outcomes
- Relapse = OVERDOSE RISK



THE MIX

- Fentanyl is 50x more potent than heroin
- Nitazene is 40 x more potent than Fentanyl
- Xylazine is now ravaging communities in the US.
- MAT drugs cannot match its strength
- People overdose even while in treatment



THE OVERDOSE GATEWAY

- Overdose is clear evidence that the individual's addiction is life threatening.
- The person **is** incapacitated.
- Reviving without rescue **is not** compassion.
- Resuscitation without a plan is reckless.

WHY?

The Addiction Economy

Addiction is a \$250–350 Billion industry in the U.S.

Legal and illegal systems both profit from repeat dependency, not healing.

- Legal: Patients become long-term customers
- Illegal: Addicts become repeat buyers
- Both: Revenue increases with chronic use



Same Goal, Different Wrapping

- Both systems rely on dependency for revenue
- Addicts are not patients or victims they are customers
- The difference is <u>legality</u>, not morality



MAT IS BIG BUSINESS

- Methadone \$693M industry and rising
- Suboxone: \$1.9B industry and rising
- Clinics rewarded for enrollment, not recovery
- Financial incentives drive expansion



A BETTER WAY FORWARD

- Long-term, drug-free programs succeed
 - Address trauma, identity, relationships
 - Emphasize healing, reintegration, freedom
 - Provide the crucial time required to be wholly restored.

PROTECT RECOVERY CHOICE

- Require all treatment providers and courts to offer MAT-free recovery options alongside MAT programs.
- Mandate informed consent laws that ensure individuals are clearly told MAT is not the only path to recovery.
- Make freedom from addiction a choice.



FREEDOM TO CHOOSE FREEDOM

Independent & Self-staining

 Faith-based long-term recovery homes do not seek state funding or OASAS licensure, yet they have restored lives for decades.

Freedom of Choice

 Legislation should acknowledge these programs as legitimate recovery pathways, ensuring families can choose them without penalty.

Complementary, Not Competitive

• These homes do not replace clinical treatment, but they fill a critical gap in long-term, abstinence-centered recovery.



RELEASE OR RESCUE

Current System

- Revive with Narcan
- Release back to danger
- Repeat until death

- Jonathan's Legacy
 - Acknowledge incapacity
 - Initiates Life saving Intervention
 - The goal Drug Independence





The undeniable statistics, the repeated overdoses are repeated sentinel event – Ignoring that fact is willful negligence.

POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS

- Create long-term, drug-free residential recovery programs fully funded as equal alternatives to MAT
- Offer people a path to full sobriety not just chemical maintenance – with life skills, job training and family restoration.
- Mandate incapacitation at overdose as a life-saving intervention
- Track recovery, not retention
- Protect recovery choice

CONCLUSION

 Sullivan County stands at a crossroads. Without bold legislative action, overdose deaths will continue to devastate families and communities. Jonathan's Legacy Legislation offers a clear path forward by restoring individual dignity, rebuilding family systems, and reclaiming our communities from addiction—not with dependency, but with freedom.
