

• Investing in Our Children: DSS-Services is near full staffing, including the positions that were added in the 2025 budget following the Bonadio report's recommendations. For the first time since at least the Great Recession, Sullivan County DSS now has the opportunity to embed caseworkers in local schools to provide more direct and responsive preventive services and supports.

### **Economic Opportunities**

• Addressing the Housing Crisis: DSS received some great news at the end of July - Requests made earlier this year were approved as of July 25<sup>th</sup> to increase authorized public assistance payments (known as PASS supplements) to clients for their housing. After several years of advocacy from counties and OTDA, the Division of Budget appears to have agreed with our collective position that it makes much more sense to pay rents than hotel rates. Families of four who, prior to July 25<sup>th</sup>, were receiving a maximum of \$335/month to pay for their housing are now entitled to a maximum of \$1,039 per month.

- Overdoses in July: Overdose statistics for July were not available as of the date of submission of this report, but are expected to be reported before August 14th. They will be briefed to the Committee during the meeting.
- Coalition for a Vape Free Sullivan: No update on the arrival of Juul settlement funding. The Coalition for a Vape Free Sullivan plans to work together with stakeholders to recommend a cooperative spending plan for funds that will be distributed to both County Government and BOCES. After the coalition partners develop a plan, the plan will be shared with the public via the Legislature and BOCES' board for final decisions on spending.
- Oxford House: Contract is signed to bring 24 sober living beds to Sullivan County over the course of the next 12 months. Oxford House's planning team is currently seeking available units, and is partnering directly with Step One a new local provider, expanding into Sullivan County from Ulster.
- **Recovery Celebration**: Scheduled for September 19, 2025 (3–6 PM at Hanofee Park). Led by the Drug Task Force TX Pillar to reduce stigma and celebrate recovery.
- Lexington Collaborations: <u>Garnet Health</u>: Lease and inpatient rehab site development ongoing. <u>DA's Office</u>: Support continues for relocation logistics and compliance.




- **New Funding Anticipated:** We are waiting for detailed information on how funding will be locally distributed from the Purdue Pharma/Sackler Family settlement and other recent settlements. New York State is expected to receive \$241.2million from the Purdue settlement alone.
- Opioid Settlement Fund Obligations: The chart above provides a brief summary of organizations under contract and receiving opioid settlement funding, and the actions each of those organizations is taking in support of the Drug Task Force. This chart does not include funds use by the county to acquire items and services needed for use by the Drug Task Force (i.e. software subscriptions to support counter narcotics investigations, palm cards, vending machines, etc.).
- Potential New Opioid Settlement Fund Projects: The Drug Task Force will consider two major projects for future funding at upcoming pillar lead meetings. One is future funding for the RESTART program which provides school-based substance use treatment at Sullivan BOCES. The other will be for the potential use of opioid settlement funds to support capital funding for Sullivan County's stabilization center.



# Social Care Network Update

- Expanding Unite Us Capacity across County Government: DHHS, Compliance and County Attorney staff met on August 4 with reps from Unite Us and Hudson Valley Care to resolve compliance, privacy, and legal matters related to the expansion of Unite Us use by county staff. We will look to finalize the updated contracts, approved last month, in the coming weeks. The new contracts will enable all DHHS personnel to participate on the Unite Us social care network and for Community Services to bill Hudson Valley Care for enhanced Medicaid service screenings in support of the 1115 social care network demonstration.

### DCS Update - Local Government Unit

### **Single Point of Access (SPOA) Program:**

- On June 12, 2025, the Adult SPOA Committee met via Zoom with 6 new cases reviewed and 6 previous cases reviewed.
- Clients were recommended for/linked to various services, including: behavioral health treatment providers, RSS housing (apartment program and community residences), Access: Supported Housing, OFA, Adult Protective Services, Action Toward Independence, Independent Living, Inc., and DCS Care Management services.
- Children's SPOA Committee met via Zoom on June 26, 2025, and went over 1 new referral and 6 previous referrals.

### **Systems Coordination & Strategic Planning**

- System of Care Taskforce: Fall mixer for local youth physical and behavioral health providers set for September 25
- Community Services Board Planning: The 2025 Local Services Plan was submitted on June 30, 2025
- State Pass-Through Contracts: Short Line contract updated and finalized; remaining contracts near completion.
- **Criminal Procedure Law (CPL) Section 730 Court Diversion**: Looking to continue training with magistrates part of compliance work and to reduce cost of placements.

### **Peer & Community Support Services**

- Peer court navigator is onboard and receiving referrals.
- Sullivan County Jail (SCJ) Monthly Meetings: Continues with complex case reviews. New peer court navigator for SCJ onboarded.
- **Fatality Review Board**: Model reviewed; stakeholder engagement continues. Data challenges with coroners/volunteers persist due to complexities of HIPAA and other confidentiality rules.
- Threat Assessment Training: Curriculum and training schedule in active development




<u>Open access</u>: extended this past January to 2 mornings per week on Tuesday & Thursdays. We continue to see increased utilization and reduced wait times from this change.

- Mobile Crisis Services Enhancement: Resolution passed. RFP issued April 14 but no responses; next steps under discussion with OMH.




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## Rental Supplement Program Update

- Inflation, prevailing wage, and climate policy changes are accelerating construction costs.
  - Conversion costs for hotels reach \$500,000 per unit.
  - Current estimate for this Center is \$400,000 per unit.
  - Our project will be competitive for an \$8million grant from NYS
- Hotel costs are also accelerating rapidly.
  - Final 2024 emergency housing cost: \$3,493,975
  - Emergency housing costs are 71% local / 29% state
  - When we can work with clients, we can get them to much cheaper housing solutions faster (see below)
- There is an extensive public record telling us hotels are not the right answer for Sullivan County
  - 2016 State Comptroller Report, 2024 Grand Jury Report

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


