#### Vaccination:

- We continue to encourage all staff to get their booster though this is no longer a requirement.
- As of this report, there are no positive COVID cases of residents or staff in the facility.

### <u>Infection Control</u>:

- All staff and visitors continue to be screened when entering the facility.
- NYS Department of Health requires surveys completed 5 days a week. Information collected includes staffing totals, total staff tests conducted and the count of available PPE supplies

## **Administration & Staffing:**

- We continue to have several vacancies in our nursing department. We have filled per diem nursing assistant vacancies. We are using various staffing agencies to cover shifts. We are also working with a new corporate recruiter to generate more candidates.
- We have re-attracted multiple staff that have previously left the facility including CNA and RN Staff, also others that are looking for work. We have increased the number of domestic aide positions as well and are actively recruiting for that to provide our clinical and care giving staff, as well as use this position as a possible spring board to see if some may be interested in becoming a CNA.
- Clinical students have returned to the facility and we are also working on partnering with Sullivan BOCES There was recently a virtual job fair which the facility participated in, we also have been getting many recommendations and referrals from our staff for other staff members.
- One CNA is in current class at Tenbroeck Center for Rehab & Nursing, two are scheduled to test by October 11<sup>th</sup>, one is completing class with school (BOCES). We have hired and retained 54 employees since September 2021.
- 6 new CNA to be added to the evening shift ow by October 11th.
- Unit 1 is open and is starting to pick up speed!
- New Dietary Director started and we are getting a lot of compliments on menu improvements!

### **Director's Comments / Local Government Unit Update:**

#### **Care Management:**

• The care management unit continues to actively engage clients for both of the Health Home agencies and the HARP Services (Health and Recovery Plan) which are Medicaid and Medicaid Managed Care Health Plans. As of the end of August 2022, there are four (4) active AOT orders and two (2) people on enhanced services with one (1) investigation pending.

#### Adult & Children's SPOA:

- On August 11, 2022, the Adult SPOA Committee met over the phone. Eight new cases were reviewed and 52 previous cases were reviewed.
- There are 9 people on the list for Family Care. At this time, there are no openings.
- Supportive Housing provided by RSS: 139 (+22) beds filled, 22 (no change from last month) openings for supportive apartments, 390 (+0) waitlisted
- Coordination of referrals and ongoing collaboration with service providers continue. Clients were recommended for/linked to various services, including: behavioral health treatment providers, RSS housing (apartment program and community residences), Access: Supported Housing, Sullivan PROS Program, OFA, APS, Action Toward Independence, Independent Living, Inc., and Care Management services.
- Children's SPOA Committee met on August 25, 2022 over the phone and went over 3 new referrals and reviewed 16 previous referrals.

### Behavioral Health Clinic (Mental Health and Substance Abuse):

- High Risk Clients: 203 clients on the roster for high risk census for August.
- The Overdose Prevention CQI Project: We received a positive review of our opioid overdose initiatives by the Overdose Preventions Project. We have been asked to share some of our policy and procedures implemented inter-agency with the other agency participants.

#### **Local Government Unit:**

- Healing Communities Study moving forward need to fill positions to aide with the mandatory requirements, will be a great initiative in saving lives
- Attended national-level Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America (CADCA) conference

# **Senior Community Services Coordinator:**

- Continued participation in the HEALing Communities Study as a Wave 2 Community: Phases 1 & 2 of the Communities that HEAL Intervention with ongoing planning and continued collaboration with community stakeholders.
- United Sullivan: Counteracting Provider Burnout Training offered to health and human services staff, resource sharing.
- Processed 2 Agreements with Universities for Social Work Internships at DCS

# **Social Services:**

- As of 9-7-2022 the following amounts have been disbursed under ERAP:
  - Rental arrears payments- 611 benefits, \$ 4,752,743.76
  - Average payment of \$ 7,778.63
  - Prospective rent payments- 480 benefits, \$ 1,451,395.91
  - Average payment of \$ 3,023.74
- The HEAP Heating Repair and Replacement Program and Clean and Tune benefit are still available. All other components of the program are currently closed.



• Developed the Homeless Services Plan and Code Blue Budgets to operate the warming centers in the Code Blue season. Both plans are pending approval by OTDA.



#### **Director's Comments:**

- The 2022-24 Community Health Assessment planning process is progressing and on track, and focus groups, data analysis will continue to be reviewed and coordinated with Garnet through August with final draft submitted in September, followed by collaborative work on updating the CHIP (Community Health Improvement Plan).
- Attended NYSACHO board and committee meetings virtually, reviewed requirements of state's healthcare worker bonus program for eligibility of public health staff titles. Discussions ongoing with state to advocate that all titles be included. Discussions with Human Resources Commissioner.
- Attended Hands4Health Network meeting, monthly Policy Pillar meeting of Drug Task Force, PRASAD Advisory Committee
- Director was appointed to the NYSAC standing committees on Public Health & Mental Health, and Children & Youth with Special Healthcare Needs
- Imminent Threat to Public Health (ITPH) declared by state DOH Commissioner –allows 50% reimbursement on monkeypox related activities, outreach, planning and vaccine clinics.
- We were unsuccessful in our request to Garnet Catskills to adopt the rabies prophylaxis administration procedure utilized @ Garnet Orange. This was determined to not be an option this year but will be kept on the calendar to revisit in 2023.

#### **Early Care Program:**

- Received \$65,162.54 in SED revenue in August 2022 and \$1993.25 in El Revenue in August 2022.
- Total revenue for 2022 is \$265,162.54 in SED Medicaid and \$21,038.00 in DOH-EI revenue.
- Met with new provider G&D to go over paperwork, etc., They are awaiting SED approval as a daycare provider for children with special needs.
- Monticello School District has been approved by SED to open a Preschool Center-Based Program to help fill the void left by Project Excel's closure. There is no definite opening date; perhaps October or November 2022.


# Certified Home Health Agency/CHHA /LTHHCP/MCH

- August 2022: The average daily census decreased slightly from 181.8 to 177.6, with total patient days 5492.
- The average daily census increased from 181.8 to 191.2 with total patient days 5926. We had 287 CHHA specific patients, 3 LTHHCP, and 29 MCH with a grand total of 319 patients on caseload throughout the month.

## Maternal Child Health (MCH):

- 9 Referrals received, 5 Opened to care. 4 not taken under care 3 parent refusals. 2 from WCMC (1 SUD -not referred by CPS/1 ortho); 2 Garnet (for breastfeeding and parenting support); 4 CPS referrals (2/4 were late to refer/pending closure of CPS case therefor parents refused RN); 1 from SCPHS Epi elevated blood lead level.
- 7 used new form; 2 from WCMC/Allscripts
- 2 SUD 1:2 referred by CPS; 1 Newborn Screen

- Census MCH: Stayed @ 29
- There were 37 MCH Visits and 16 CPS visits in the month of August.



## **Epidemiology and Emergency Planning:**

• JYNNEOS 1st and 2nd dose clinics are being held at Public Health. Covid-19 Bivalent Booster clinics are being planned for around the county, as well as flu clinics. Polio clinics are being planned in coordination with Hatzolah. Routine immunization clinics @ PHS continued. All told the Epidemiology staff investigated 104 cases of other communicable diseases (not STIs, Covid-19, or Rabies).
