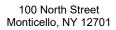



Division of Community Resources Monthly Report September 2022

✓ Submitted Application to Regional Economic Development Council for Community Development Block Grant funding. If awarded the grant will support a Senior needs assessment and resulting plan.

Workforce Development

- ✓ The 2022 Summer Youth Employment Program successfully ended August 19th. There was a total of eleven (11) sites throughout the County including Bold Gold Media, United Way, Monticello School, Livingston Manor School, Department of Environmental Protection, Youth Economic Group, Center for Workforce Development (CWD), Upper Delaware Campgrounds, Lake Superior Park, SC Visitors Association and the Veterans Department. The end of season picnic was held with a presentation and awards ceremony with several local businesses donating food and supplies. Final reports are due by October and associated costs and all financials are due by December.
- ✓ Work Readiness Training, LLC was awarded a contract to provide leadership development services to WIOA eligible juniors and seniors at Fallsburg High School starting this September. The program will provide 6 to 8 experiential learning leadership activities incorporating non-profit and business opportunities for civic engagement, service learning and work readiness programs. Students will present at the end of the school year to the Fallsburg School Board of Education and the Workforce Development Board.
- ✓ Conversations have begun with SC BOCES and SUNY Sullivan on developing trade skills programs.
- ✓ The Center for Workforce Development (CWD) is under a second audit by the NYS Department of Labor (DOL) for WIOA PY21 funding. Due to Covid, the NYS Dept. of Labor is behind in their audits and is now looking to catch up on departmental audits from Financial Management, Procurement, Property Management and Monitoring. Audits are now being completed through zoom meetings with all documentation being transmitted electronically through secure sites.
- ✓ A WARN letter was received from the NYS Department of Labor that Garnet Health Medical Doctors (GHD) is closing several practices permanently effective November 9, 2022.

This will impact 29 employees. The CWD is working with NYS DOL's Rapid Response Team.

- ✓ The Disaster Recovery National Dislocated Worker Grant (DR-NDWG) which the CWD applied for and received \$259,990 to put "Clerk" positions in place for Covid related back log is continuing with great success. There are 13 rotating positions within the CWD budget and have continued to supply participating county departments with Clerk's to assist with their departmental Covid related needs. The departments participating are CWD, Social Services, Public Health, Human Resources and Veterans. As of August 2022, six (6) of these Clerks have been hired directly into County positions. The program was extended to March of 2023.
- ✓ The DRC position will work to support and expand partnerships, collaboration, service coordination, and service delivery across multiple education, workforce and disability systems. The increased coordination with systems and the business community will help to create sustainable career paths.

<u>Update:</u> The staff member has completed and passed the required certifications and is now mandated to do a monthlong case study. All documentation has been signed by the County to work with NYESS who will be the administrator of the revenue for the Ticket to Work Program. We are awaiting instruction for the FBI fingerprinting and background checks to be completed for three staff members essential to this program.

Labor Market Data for July 2022 compared to July 2021

✓ Sullivan County saw an increase 11.0% (3,100) in total nonfarm jobs and an increase 11.6% (2,700) in total private sector jobs.

Sullivan County had the fastest growth year over year in the Hudson Valley region for private sector job gains (11.6%).

Sullivan County had the second highest nonfarm growth rate among small counties in the NYS at 11.0%

Please note: The net month (June '22 – July '22) showed a gain of 3.3% (1,000) nonfarm jobs and a gain of 6.6% (1,600) private sector jobs.

- ✓ For Sullivan County the largest job gains were:
 - Leisure & Hospitality at 44.7% (2,100)
 - Government at 8.3% (400)
 - Natural Resources, Mining & Construction at 15.4%
 (200)
 - Manufacturing at 12.5% (200)
 - Information at 100% (100)
 - Other Services at 8.3% (100)
 - Business and Professional Services at 5.9% (100)

All other industries showed no job growth in July 2022 over July 2021.

✓ NYS showed an increase of 5.0% (451,100) in total nonfarm jobs and 5.5% (421,500) in private sector jobs.

The largest jobs gains were found in:

- Leisure & Hospitality at 14.7% (117,600)
- Professional & Business Services at 7.0% (90,600)
- Education and Health Services at 4.4% (88,600)
- Trade, Transportation & Utilities at 3.7% (52,000)
- ✓ The Hudson Valley region showed an increase of 3.4% (30,900) in total nonfarm jobs and an increase of 4.2% (32,100) in private sector jobs.

The largest job gains were found in:

- Leisure & Hospitality at 9.4% (8,800)
- Professional and Business Services at 7.3% (8,200)
- Education and Health Services at 3.0% (6,000)
- Other Services at 10.2% (4,000)

The Region's job losses were in:

- Financial Activities at -3.1% (-1,400)
- Government at -0.9% (-1,200)
- ✓ Sullivan County's unemployment rate was 3.2% for July 2022 down from 4.9% in July 2021.

July 2022 had 39,900 people in the labor force (38,600 employed & 1,300 unemployed). This reflects an overall increase of 2,500 people in the labor force compared to July 2021.

- ✓ The Hudson Valley's unemployment rate for July 2022 is 3.4% compared to 4.9% in July 2021.
- ✓ NYS's unemployment rate was 4.8% in July 2022 compared to 7.1% in July 2021.

- ✓ The July 2022 unemployment rates across the 62 NYS counties ranged from a low of 2.6% for Hamilton County to a high of 9.1% for Bronx County. Sullivan County with a 3.2% rate ranked 10th in the State along with Putnam, Rockland, Schuyler, Tioga, Tompkins, Warren and Washington counties.
- ✓ Hudson Valley unemployment rankings for July 2022:
 - #10 Rockland County at 3.2%
 - #10 Putnam County at 3.2%
 - #10 Sullivan County at 3.2%
 - #19 Dutchess County at 3.3%
 - #24 Ulster County at 3.4%

Transportation

- ✓ Effective August 1, 2022, the fares for Move Sullivan public transit routes will be paid for by the County. This suspension of public payment is in effect through December 31, 2023. This also applies to the riders of the complementary paratransit services.
- ✓ The expansion by 2 additional routes is slated to begin September 1.

Community Assistance Center (CAC)

- ✓ The CAC has been coordinating the countywide mask and test kit distribution.
- ✓ The team continues to provide referral and assistance to callers looking for vaccines and/or information.
- ✓ The CAC remains active providing food assistance deliveries as well as connections to community resources.
- ✓ The Thursday Food Bank deliveries to the pantries are now twice a month. Salvation Army box deliveries continue unchanged.

Office for the Aging - Monthly Report: July 2022

Highlights:

- ✓ Continue to assist with CAC efforts distributing masks and test kits, answering phones, providing referrals and information and vaccination access.
- ✓ Participating in case review with EMDT & APS regarding mutual clients.
- ✓ OFA newsletter. "The Monthly Hoot" has been sent to the publisher, this will provide outreach opportunities both in print and online, at no cost to County.
- ✓ Participation as board member at large of Association on Aging in NY.
- ✓ Continue to participate in Sullivan County Food Security Roundtable efforts.
- ✓ Along with Division, participated in various community outreach events.

- ✓ Farmer's Market Coupons- shipment delayed but swiftly organized for distribution, we have already depleted original allocation of 680 booklets and have received a second small allocation. Coupons are in booklets of \$25 this year instead of \$20.
- ✓ Director and Full Charge Bookkeeper attended Regional Caucus/Fiscal Training in Schoharie County

- ✓ Client interactions -49
- ✓ Outreach at libraries and other community events ongoing, continuation of distribution of test kits & masks.

Personal Emergency Response Systems (PERS)

✓ 29 clients receive PERS medical monitoring through the OFA.

Nutrition Program

- ✓ Nutrition department continues to help unload Food Bank delivery twice monthly for ECAC, and delivers care packages when needed.
- ✓ Nutrition program is still struggling with staff vacancies. Because of this, we are unable to open senior centers for congregate meals, grab and go sites have been successful and target of October to reopen if staffing permits.

- ✓ Received 6 new referrals, 4 were assessed and started on the HDM program, 2 are pending services.
- ✓ Totals for July 2022 Homebound meals: 1577 units for 90 clients Congregate meals: 1145 units for 77 clients



- ✓ Submitted budget amendment and supporting documentation for participation in PILOT program offered through AmeriCorps to reduce administrative burden on the current 3-year grant award.
- ✓ Recruitment efforts: recruited 1 new volunteer for the Veterans Needlework/Crochet program; 1 new volunteer at WJFF Radio Catskill; 1 at the Delaware Valley Arts Alliance; and 1 in the Medical Transportation Program. The RSVP Coordinator has also joined the ranks of AmeriCorps RSVP Volunteer and is assisting with community outreach and support.
- ✓ Station monitoring is ongoing and included the Sullivan County Visitors Association, Sullivan West Library, IOU Main Street Thrift Shop, and Noah's Arch Thrift Shop.
- ✓ Volunteer Station Community Spotlight Noah's Arch Thrift Shop
- ✓ I would like to share the work that our RSVP AmeriCorps Volunteers perform at our Noah's Arch Thrift Shop located in the basement of the Monticello United Methodist Church, 445 Broadway, and are open yearround on Wednesdays and Saturdays between 10:00am − 2:00 pm. The Shop is staffed with volunteers and has been accepting gently used donations of clothing, shoes, small housewares, holiday items and linens for many years. Items are available at discounted prices. The proceeds from the thrift shop help maintain the year-round programs and services offered through the Church. It is not uncommon for them to offer additional assistance to those facing personal hardships. As part of their direct services program, the store offers clothing, children's items, linens and many other small household items. They accept donations Wednesday and Saturday between 10:00 am − 1:00 pm. They are presently in need of baby items, children's clothing and men's clothing for those who may wish to donate their gently used items.
- ✓ One of our volunteers, Nellie Culligan, is celebrating her 29th year of service with the RSVP AmeriCorps program and the Noah's Arch Thrift Shop. Nellie has over 11,088 lifetime hours with the program.
- ✓ Community outreach: Met with the Mamakating Seniors who have joined our network to distribute information to our seniors. Held a "meet and greet" at the Eldred Sunshine Free Library for area residents.
- ✓ Donated blankets to the Veterans Service Agency to be distributed to area Veterans.

- ✓ Attended: AmeriCorps Roundtable for Veteran & Military-Serving Organizations; NCCS RSVP Town Hall Meeting.
- ✓ RSVP is required under our AmeriCorps grant to survey our volunteers of their satisfaction with the program. Below please find the survey results.

ACTIVITY REPORT - AUGUST 2022 COUNTY OF SULLIVAN INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY (IDA), SULLIVAN COUNTY FUNDING CORPORATION (SCFC), THE SULLIVAN COUNTY INFRASTRUCTURE LOCAL DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION (TSCILDC)


The IDA, SCFC, and TSCILDC Boards each met on Monday, August 8th. The IDA and TSCILDC Boards met only to conduct the routine business of approving meeting minutes and payment schedules. At its meeting, the SCFC Board discussed the status and future of its Millennium Revolving Loan Fund. The IDA has three revolving loan and lease funds which, like SCFC's Millennium Revolving Loan Fund, are underutilized. Given the availability of IDA loan funds and the relative lack of new applications under any IDA or SCFC loan programs, the SCFC Board adopted a resolution terminating the Millennium Revolving Loan Fund and authorizing the use of monies in this fund, and future loan repayments of current loans made by the fund, for other economic development purposes.

Staff is working to draft the 2023 IDA, SCFC, and TSCILDC budgets for initial discussion by the Boards in September, and final review and approval in October. In accordance with the Public Authorities Reform Act, the final approved budgets must be submitted to various State and local offices by November 1.

We are also gathering information for the 2022 IDA, SCFC, and TSCILDC Public Authorities Reporting Information System (PARIS) reports, to be submitted to the New York State Authorities Budget Office after December 31st.

The September 12th IDA Board meeting will be held via Zoom, in accordance with Governor Hochul's August 13th executive order extending the remote meeting authorization through September 12th.
